HISTORY

In 1982, Archbishop Philip Hannan, Bishop Roger Morin and Gregory Ben Johnson founded Second Harvest Food Bank to address the great need they saw in the faces of thousands of hungry men, women and children in our community. In 1985, Second Harvest joined America's Second Harvest – The Nation's Food Bank Network (now known as Feeding America), allowing it to receive food and funds from donors across the country. Thanks to generous support from donors and partners like you, our service area and reach have expanded over the years to serve people experiencing hunger in 23 parishes from the Mississippi state line to the Texas border. Every year, we secure millions of pounds of food that otherwise would have gone to waste and ensure that meals make it to the dinner tables of thousands of families facing hunger in South Louisiana.



MISSION & GOALS

Second Harvest has a mission to lead the fight against hunger and build food security in South Louisiana by providing food access, advocacy, education and disaster response. Second Harvest provides food to community members in need through 500+ programs and partner agencies across South Louisiana. Together, we make up the largest charitable anti-hunger network in the state. With your help, we can make food security a reality for every household in our community. Second Harvest is an affiliated ministry of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New Orleans and a member of Feeding America and United Way.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As this Annual Report for fiscal years 2019 and 2020 goes to press, a hoped-for return to the “new normal” for many has been interrupted yet again by a resurgence in the COVID-19 pandemic and the aftermath of Hurricane Ida. During the past year, Second Harvest staff and volunteers have helped countless neighbors impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic emergency. Thousands have been people who have never visited a food pantry and they tell us, “I never thought I’d need help with food for my family.” Thousands more lined up for hours at mass distributions of food and supplies.

In many ways, it resembled numerous disasters we have responded to in the past, except that after a hurricane, there is a light at the end of the tunnel and a limited area that has been impacted. For our team, their families, and those we serve, the pandemic and our response to it seemed to have no end in sight. It was an incredible time of sacrifice and caring for our neighbors, not just in one part of the state hit by a storm, but in every parish and every zip code across Louisiana and the nation.

We never thought seeing grandparents being able to hug their grandchildren again would be such a defining moment of our recovery, after what felt like a lifetime apart. But even as parts of our economy and social lives come back, other parts of our economy, like the tourism and convention business, will take much more time to fully recover. Many iconic businesses have closed for good, and countless good-paying jobs are gone forever.

So many people who sought help with food through 2020 and 2021 were going through a difficult life event, atop the stresses of the pandemic. One 77-year-old woman from Lafayette told us recently, “We lost my husband to cancer, and all our savings went to his treatments before he died.” Often, seniors like her are living on fixed incomes and only qualify for less than \$100 a month in food stamps. Thousands of people suddenly find themselves in the same boat every week of the year.

While Second Harvest is experienced in responding to emergencies like the pandemic, for nearly 40 years our focus has been the day-to-day job of helping hundreds of thousands of South Louisianans overcome food insecurity and have better access to good nutrition. Thanks to you, we continue to expand our work to have the greatest impact we can for the people we serve.

The past year has been a test of our strength as a community, and you have made a difference by helping Second Harvest respond during these extraordinary circumstances. We will face more challenges to come in hurricanes, storms, freezes, flooding, and from the *everyday disaster of hunger*. Absolutely everything Second Harvest does is because people like you donated time, money, food, and prayers.

On behalf of everyone we serve, thank you for your trust in Second Harvest and our mission.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION

Many people are surprised by the full scope and scale of our mission. Second Harvest provides food to children, families, and seniors facing hunger through hundreds of local partners including food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, and other programs. Our service area extends from the Mississippi border to the Texas state line covering Greater New Orleans, the Northshore, Houma-Thibodaux, Lafayette, Lake Charles, and all points in between.

Our Daily Bread in Hammond, Louisiana is just one of hundreds of local partners offering a community food pantry and soup kitchen supported by your donations to Second Harvest. We met Amanda there, a young mother who started coming to Our Daily Bread about a year ago following a breakup with her husband. One of the pantry's staff told us, "She at first was sad and discouraged. She said she was so depressed at the thought of raising her kids on her own. But on her return visits, she told us how much visiting our pantry brightened her day."

The staff and volunteers of Our Daily Bread supplied Amanda with food, but also provided counseling to help with her family problems. Thanks to their help, Amanda and her husband have worked things out and they recently remarried. "She came in as a depressed single mother, and now she's an empowered wife and mom who feels that her life has been transformed," the volunteer said. "The hope of getting the food she needed every month and the positive relationships we had with her created thankfulness in her day."

Every month, Second Harvest delivers more than 70,000 pounds of food, the equivalent of 58,000 meals to Our Daily Bread's pantry in Tangipahoa Parish. In addition to serving local Hammond residents four days a week, this pantry also provides food to more than two dozen smaller pantries throughout the parish.

John Hair, the pantry's Director, said their mission goes beyond putting food on tables. "It's our mission to help with their life problems, if we can, that bring them to our food pantry. And it's important that our staff and volunteers understand what these neighbors are going through."

One hundred miles away, another Second Harvest community partner helps residents of Scott, Louisiana. True Vine Ministries became a partner of Second Harvest in 2014, growing from a small pantry to supporting hundreds of families in their area.

"I saw how the need was for low-income families, and especially for the elderly," said True Vine pantry Director Judy Francis. "Just so many people who slip through the cracks, you don't hear about them because they don't have a voice."

By partnering with Second Harvest, Judy and her team created what looks like a small grocery store where those in need can "shop" for nutritious groceries at no charge. In addition to meat, canned goods, and fresh produce, visitors can also get personal hygiene items, thanks to Second Harvest supporters.

"It's a good thing that helps with their self-esteem, because they're choosing their food, and we're not choosing it for them," she told us.

Because of donors like you, we are able to support hundreds of community organizations like these across South Louisiana. Thank you for helping Amanda and so many more in their time of need.

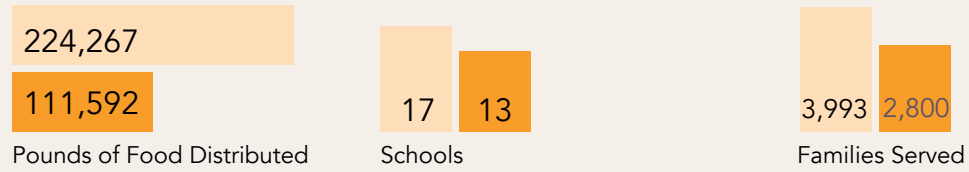

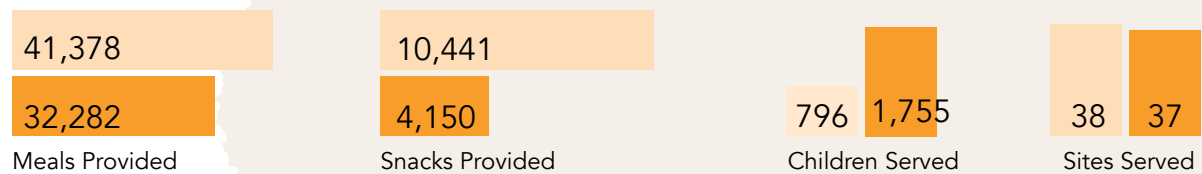

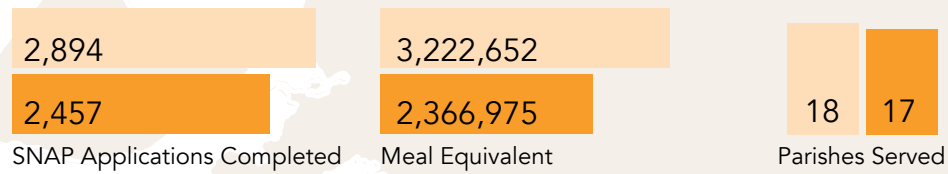

FEEDING CHILDREN

One in four children in South Louisiana faces the prospect of hunger every day. Second Harvest's child nutrition programs ensure thousands of children have the healthy food and support they need to learn, grow, and thrive.

Every day, teachers witness children who have not had dinner the night before or breakfast before school and are too hungry to learn. One teacher, Ms. Marlena, says, "Our students come to us daily with their needs unmet. While we are unable to solve all of their problems, the School Pantry has afforded us the ability to solve one important one: hunger."

Schools are an ideal location to serve children and families. Working parents can't miss work to visit a food pantry with mid-day hours. The school pantry program addresses this need by serving children and their families at the schools where they attend and already feel comfortable.

Following the school day, our after-school Kids Café program is an important way your support helps children. Every week during the school year, Second Harvest staff and volunteers prepare, package, and deliver thousands of hot meals and snacks to children across our 23-parish service area. For many children, it can make an incredible impact.

"Many children don't eat very well at home," according to Second Harvest Children's Programs Manager, Tanya O'Reilly. "To be able to provide at least one well-rounded, nutritious meal after school can make all the difference in the world."

After the school year concludes every May, our staff and volunteers continue serving children in need from our 6,500 square-foot Community Kitchen. During the long, hot Louisiana summer, our team prepares thousands of meals each week to deliver to children at sites such as schools, libraries, community centers, and other places where children gather for structure and relief from the heat. Madison W. is a parent who works two jobs and is grateful for the meals her two daughters receive at their neighborhood public library.

"I'm so glad my girls have a safe place to study and eat, and be supervised, while I'm still at work," she told us. "It also helps so much with our finances. Buying an extra meal for both girls five days a week can get expensive on our limited budget."

It's hard to learn on an empty stomach, and many kids can't focus due to hunger. When children have access to healthy meals every day, they feel better and do better in school. They have what they need to grow, play, and learn.

OUR COVID RESPONSE

Beginning in March 2020, the lives of millions of people in Louisiana and across the nation were turned upside down. The COVID-19 pandemic has caused hardship for countless neighbors who have experienced unemployment and food insecurity. Shuttered businesses, lost wages, closed schools, and social distancing led to hundreds of thousands more Louisianans facing hunger.

People have turned to Second Harvest Food Bank for the first time in their lives and others have needed us more than ever before. Thanks to your generous support, Second Harvest has responded to the overwhelming need for groceries and meals during these challenging times.

Second Harvest staff and volunteers have worked long hours over many months to respond to these unprecedented needs. We also had to be flexible to adapt to constantly changing circumstances and to change the ways we normally do business. Unlike a hurricane or other localized disaster, the COVID-19 crisis impacted every community in our state and across the country.

"This emergency was like nothing we've ever seen," said Natalie Jayroe, Second Harvest President and CEO. "For the COVID-19 crisis, we have been providing meals and support to residents of every community in our 23-parish area."

Second Harvest and our partners immediately set up drive-through food distributions that could serve thousands of households in a safe and socially distanced format. Second Harvest had to purchase more food than ever before as our food donation supply chains were disrupted. We launched home delivery programs to bring food boxes and meals directly to seniors and people quarantined in their homes. And staff and volunteers dramatically increased meal production in our Community Kitchen to more than 10,000 meals per day during the peak of the crisis.

"There is no way we could have done this without the incredible support of our donors," Jayroe said. "A million thanks to everyone who made this possible."

FEEDING SENIORS

Ms. Geraldine Bickham is no stranger to hard work. "I worked my whole life, from the Southdown Sugar Mill, to working in restaurants, and cleaning houses on my hands and knees," the 79-year-old Houma resident told us. Now, after a lifetime of work, she relies on a limited income from Social Security to get by every month.

"I have to make everything happen from that one check. It's very tough some months."

Ms. Bickham says that's why she's so thankful for the Plymouth Rock Baptist Church of Houma food pantry, one of hundreds of community partners supported by Second Harvest.


"I always did what I had to do to feed my family," she said. "Now, I feel so blessed that someone is helping people like me get by."

Another of the thousands of seniors receiving help from Second Harvest every month is 86-year-old Doris Williams, who receives groceries from Second Harvest's mobile pantry truck once a month at Little Zion Baptist Church in New Orleans.

"It truly is a blessing, and I thank God and everyone who makes this food possible," she told us. Since Ms. Williams retired from her job as a telephone operator in 1992, she has lived on a small pension and a social security check. Miss Doris lives alone and doesn't have any family nearby who can help. "It's hard some months, but this food makes it so much easier for people like me who are on a fixed income."

Sadly, the stories of Ms. Bickham and Ms. Williams are far too common in South Louisiana. In fact, Louisiana is second-worst in the nation for senior hunger. "One in four seniors in our state is at risk of hunger," says Second Harvest Program Coordinator, Margie McGowen. "Many of them find it hard to turn to a food pantry after providing for themselves and others for decades. But that's why we're here, and our community partners like Plymouth Rock and Little Zion are so good at making them feel welcome."

Thank you for helping Ms. Bickham and Ms. Williams and the thousands of other retirees across our area.

VOLUNTEERS

Our mission would not be possible without the support of thousands of individuals, groups, schools, churches, and businesses who donate their time to us every day of the year.

Jules Sabrier is one of our longest-serving volunteers, serving as an inspiration to us all.

Jules recently celebrated his 10th year volunteering with Second Harvest, giving more than 2,000 hours of his time to helping others. Every Tuesday since 2011, Jules has made his way to our Community Kitchen to help others in need.

"It's hard to believe it's really been ten years," he said. "I was here when the food bank moved into this building, and everything has really grown every year."

Jules retired in 2009 after a career with the Veterans Administration, serving his fellow former service members. He joins us every Tuesday in our 6,500 square-foot Community Kitchen, helping to prepare hot meals for seniors and children. On his 10th anniversary, he was surprised to learn he had personally helped make possible more than 1.5 million meals over his decade of service.

INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS

In 2019, Second Harvest opened the first hospital-based food pantry in Louisiana and one of the first in the nation – the Therapeutic Food Pantry at University Medical Center's Cancer Center in New Orleans. Patients struggling with malnutrition and food insecurity can access this pantry for high-quality, nutritious food to help combat hunger and promote optimal health.

Gay Carroll is one of the patients and is grateful for the support it gives. "It means I don't have to worry about getting food, or worry about getting food at the end of the month. That's a real concern for someone in my position," she said. "It has helped me to eat better and feel better. I have more energy to do more things, and I feel like it has helped me survive this condition."

Ms. Carroll is a fighter and is responding well to treatments. "I have stage four breast cancer, but the doctors say I'm responding well. It's great that this pantry is here in the hospital, where people need it. It's been a really great project."

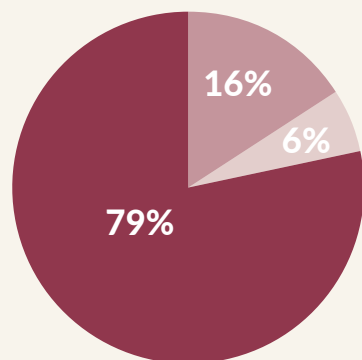
Dr. Adam Riker, surgical oncologist and Director of the Breast Health Program at UMC, says the therapeutic food pantry has absolutely made a positive impact.

"It's been an incredible transformation for our patients, because now they realize how they feel now that they're eating so much better," Dr. Riker told us. "They've got more energy; they can get through their treatments a lot easier because they're eating a higher quality of foods. More importantly, we are benefitting their immune system, which is so important for our cancer patients."

The program also offers classes to teach patients how to prepare healthy meals using the items available in the pantry, and other services to improve patients' quality of life, including massage therapy, exercise classes, art therapy, and more.

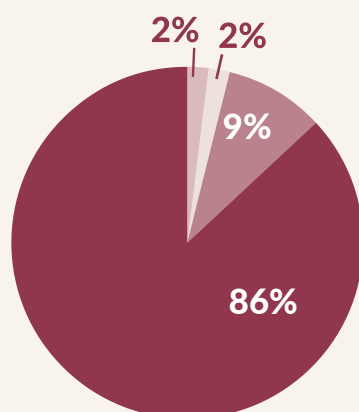

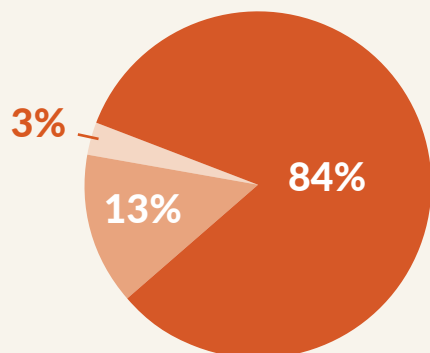

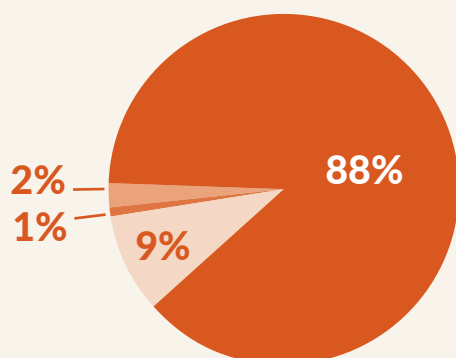
