You helped Yvette give her goddaughter the start she needed

Yvette has stomach cancer, cirrhosis, and diabetes — but those health battles are not what weigh most on her mind. Instead, it's the decision her 19-year-old goddaughter now faces.

She has to choose between going to college and staying home to help Yvette. "She doesn't want to go because of my medical problems," Yvette explains, though she encourages her goddaughter to pursue her dreams of being an artist.

The fact that she has this big decision ahead is thanks to the strong start Yvette was able to give her, and the food assistance donors like you make possible.

Since the girl was a baby, Yvette has helped care for her periodically. But one day, the child's mom left the 11-year-old girl alone with nothing more than a bag of chips and a drink. Yvette stepped in and has had custody ever since.

Those first years as a new family were an uphill battle as the young girl adapted to life with a new structure and new rules.

"I had to be hard on her," Yvette says. But her tough love paid off. Her goddaughter is now thriving. She's on the honor roll at school, and she pitches in at home to help. Knowing her goddaughter will need to strike out on her own soon is hard, but Yvette has no regrets.

"It really has been a blessing to have her," she says.

Yvette says providing for the two of them on a limited



income would be impossible without the help she gets from Second Harvest and Plymouth Rock Baptist Church. "There's no way I could do it without it," Yvette says gratefully.

Raynada is a single mother of four and an Army veteran who lives on VA disability checks supplemented by the occasional gig as a substitute teacher.

Every morning, she wakes up before dawn, her mind a whirlwind of calculations and concerns. She makes breakfast for her children — simple but made with love — and sends them off to school with a smile. But as soon as they leave, the weight of reality settles back onto her shoulders.

"You have a mortgage, you have utilities, children always have needs, period," she says, her voice tinged with a mix of exhaustion and determination. "The struggle to put food on the table is a persistent concern."

The unexpected bills that seem to come out of nowhere only add to the stress, making it difficult to stay afloat.

Raynada knows the road ahead might not be easy, but she also knows she is not walking it alone. Thanks to friends like you, Raynada can rely on the meals Second Harvest provides at the Boys & Girls Club of Acadiana.

In the quiet moments after dinner, when the children are asleep, Raynada allows herself a moment of reflection. She thinks about the community that has risen to support her, the

Evinging Nutrition Into Food Deserts

Second Harvest's newest Makin' Groceries Mobile Market has officially opened its doors. This new venture is part of our commitment to ensuring all residents have access to affordable, nutritious food.

This new location, at the James C. Simmons Community Center, serves neighbors in Waggaman, Kennedy Heights, and Avondale. These Jefferson Parish communities became a food desert when the only supermarket closed in 2019.

Unlike traditional food pantries, the Mobile Market sells fresh produce and everyday staples at lower-than-retail costs, and Second Harvest purchases food specifically for this program to ensure affordability and high quality.

Our effort is already making an impact, judging by the responses from our shoppers. Kim, a resident of Avondale, expressed her gratitude, saying, "I just got home from the Mobile Market. I can't tell you how nice it is to have this and how thankful I am." Another shopper said, "The quality of the produce looks really

nice, so I'm excited."

These sentiments are echoed by many who have visited the market. One community member remarked, "Everyone is so nice, and I am so thankful for this place because we don't have a grocery store."

The market was made possible by a partnership with Jefferson Parish Council member Byron Lee, the CF Industry Foundation, and support from donors



like you. Together, we are creating a future where everyone has access to the food they need to thrive.
