Fueling Kids for School and Play

The International School of Louisiana (ISL) in New Orleans is an immersion school, and classes are taught in either French or Spanish. Since children are instructed in a foreign language, the school day lasts longer than at other schools.

Mr. Todd, director of the ISL after-school care program, understands that by the time the kids arrive, they're tired. And hungry!

"I aim to help the kids unwind and be in a positive mindset by the time their parents pick them up," he says. Students who attend after-school care sit at a collection of covered picnic tables. Some tables have arts and crafts, some have board games, and others are for children who just want to sit and talk.

Second Harvest Food Bank provides snacks for the program, and kids refuel with things like granola bars, crackers, and juice boxes. Kids like 8-year-old Elliana, who can often be found at the arts and crafts table or enjoying a good book.

"Art is my favorite class," says the third grader. "I get



to be creative using crayons and pastels. I also love to draw. I am learning shadowing, which makes my drawing more realistic."

The ISL is just one of dozens of schools and youth programs in South Louisiana that participate in Second Harvest's Kids Cafe program. Because Kids Cafe provides snacks and meals, after-school programs can spend more resources on enrichment and educational activities instead of food.
